In the total of points scored Michael Baker heads the list, having kicked 10 penalty goals, 9 conversions, and a dropped goal in addition to scoring 2 tries giving him a total of 57 points, Alan Holder comes next with a total of 37 points, made up of 2 penalty goals, 8 conversions and 5 tries.

OFFSIDE REF!!!

Or was it? The old familiar cry was heard at full throat last Saturday when the Wasps wing-forward R. Syrett was very nearly given a pass by our Gloucester centres. This was in fact a case of being left behind by the play and Syrett was most certainly not offside, in my opinion, not in the opinion of the referee.

To set the scene. Syrett had gone up when Wasps attacked. Gloucester gained the ball after a tackle and commenced a passing movement, in the middle of which Syrett appeared from behind, very nearly intercepting and might have scored had he grasped the ball cleanly. It is a case for Law 18 (1) which states:—

"When the ball is in play, except in a scrummage or in a line-out, a player is offside if the ball has been kicked or touched or is being carried by one of his own team behind him."

It is then of course illegal to play the ball-but was Syrett offside ?
