

CARDIFF v. GLOUCESTER

Today's visitors come from the West Country, and are always a side who are hard to beat. In greeting them, we are well aware of the fact that we are in for a

hard game, and we will have to subdue one of the toughest packs in the country.

Gloucester has produced many "capped" players, the first of whom appears to be W. Yiend who was capped in 1889, although it is not certain whether he gained that honour while playing for Gloucester or Hartlepool R. Since then there have been many more international players, among which we find such names as D. R. Gent, who from 1906 gained 11 caps. Next comes S. Smart, who between 1913 and 1920 gained 12 caps. These are followed by Gloucester's most capped player, A. T. Voyce. Between 1920 and 1926 he was capped 27 times. Lastly we come to more modern times and the name of George Hastings, who, between 1955 and 1958 represented England on 13 occasions.

The present side carries on the tradition set by their illustrious predecessors. and their newest of capped players being P. Ford who has been in the England side

for most International games this season.

As we beat Gloucester at Kingsholm earlier this season, they will be all out

to reverse that decision this afternoon.

The Cardiff side at the moment seem to be going from strength to strength. Can they have had a more successful Easter programme?
