The ingredients of a Gloucester – Bristol clash always have that extra spice not apparent in most games on the Cherry and Whites' list. Victory for either side means rather more than merely defeating "the old enemy"; it becomes almost a status symbol in county – nay, West country – rugby.

We accord a particularly warm welcome to our formidable but friendly rivals from the South to Kingsholm this afternoon. Congratulations on having three players on the Canadian tour are tinged with regret that they will not be pitting their skills against Gloucester this afternoon. But such is the quality and quantity, of Bristol's reserve pool that another relentless and, we hope, refreshing, struggle will result.

KINGSHOLM KACKLE

Last season the honours undoubtedly went to Bristol. After winning at the Memorial Ground by 15 points to 3, they gave an encore when they beat a weakened Gloucester side by 14 points to 6 after trailing at

the interval – their first victory at Kingsholm since 1961.

All Gloucester's points came in the first half, David Ainge, now with Bristol, deputising for Rutherford, kicked a penalty goal, and Terry Hopson added a dropped goal. Roger Hosen replied with a penalty goal for Bristol, who scored two tries in the second half through Mike Collins and Terry Base, with Hosen converting one and Richard Sharp dropping a goal.

It is extremely gratifying to see so much support from outside the city, and a particular pleasure when one of these keen enthusiasts wins the prize for the lucky programme. Congratulations, then, to Mr. E. B. Ford, of Stonehouse, who left the Coventry game richer by £5.
