

To ring down the curtain on yet another seaso we could have no better choice as opponents – if their last visit to Kingsholm is any criteron – than Exeter, to whom we extend a cordial welcome this afternoon.

The past two seasons we have met Exeter at the County Ground during the annual Cornwall and Devon tour, and their last appearance here was on Saturday, April 30th, 1966, when they also provided Gloucester with their last match of that campaign.
