Club Notes

In 22 postwar visits to Coundon Road, Gloucester have won only four times — the last occasion being 1966—67. Victory today carries a greater prize than ever before, with a place against Moseley or Wilmslow in the R.F.U. Knockout Championship final at Twickenham on April 29th waiting.

For all their lack of success here, Gloucester are always regarded as one of Coventry's most formidable opponents, and with good reason. Some of the scars of past battles at Coundon Road or Kingsholm are still carried to this day by those who took part!

This season, things seem to be going Gloucester's way. They have impressed everyone by eliminating in succession Bath, Bristol and London Welsh from the Knockout Championship, all away from home as well. Then six of Gloucester's team this afternoon — Richard Jardine, Eric Stephens, Robin Cowling, Mike Burton, Alan Brinn and Dick Smith — contributed handsomely to Gloucestershire's County Championship final win over Warwickshire a fortnight ago.

But Coventry are only too well aware of the task facing them. They lost 16—15 at Kingsholm in September when a Steve Adams conversion attempt bounced the wrong way off the upright and won 27-17 at Coundon Road in December, on the day of the first England trial.

Now the Coventry side is beginning to look more settled than at any time for months, with Roger Creed back to provide inspiring captaincy and David Duckham, Peter Preece, Geoff Evans and Rodney Webb forming the most talented threequarter line in the land.

So the stage is set for a fascinating match and not the least cause of satisfaction for Midlands followers of the game is that the proper order of things has been established at this stage of the R.F.U.'s inaugural Knockout Championship.

Out of the reckoning have gone Harlequins and London Welsh, the fancied sides for the big city, and in at the kill are Coventry, Moseley, Gloucester and the unheralded Cheshire side, Wilmslow, whose presence gives the competition such added flavour.

Top honours in the game continue to come the way of Coventry and we extend our heartiest congratulations to Geoff Evans on winning his first England cap last Saturday at Murrayfield and to Peter Preece, who is the one player from the club so far selected for the tour of South Africa.

Geoff also wins Barbarians honours on tour in South Wales next weekend and there is still a chance for the likes of John Barton to force his way into the reckoning for the South Africa tour party with a fine display this afternoon.

Coventry, incidentally, are well on the way to another scoring record this season, with 763 points totalled so far compared with last season's all-time record of 856. Even allowing for the extra point awarded for tries this season, it will still be a formidable aggregate at the season's end with a dozen or so matches left to play.
