Lord's last Saturday.

There is a close liaison between the county cricketers and the Gloucester rugger club, who follow each others fortunes with terrific interest. This was shown on Wednesday evening at Fromehall Park, where Tony Brown and his lads watched the match between Stroud and Gloucester, and displayed the coveted Cup. Indeed, there was a special message from the Gloucestershire skipper to the rugby supporters. "Thank them sincerely for the telegram of good wishes we received from them at Lord's. It was quite the best and most original of them all!"

Tony added, "The support for us from Gloucester has been really fantastic, and we know that much of it came from the rugger boys in

the city. We all appreciate it very much indeed!"

It was a disappointment to lose the first match at Broughton Park last Saturday, but it is early days yet and we are sure that there will be plenty to cheer about as the centenary season gets under way. Skipper Mike Nicholls and his men are certainly determined to make it a memorable season. The United have already got off the mark with two remarkable away wins, and their victory over Hereford by 103 points to 3 on Tuesday evening was a club record. Congratulations

There is a feast of rugby at Kingsholm this month, for next Wednesday evening South Wales Police are the visitors (kick-off 7 p.m.) and next Saturday brings the match against Ebbw Vale.
