#### PETER PREECE

Peter is yet another of the International threequarters playing for the Coventry club produced by King Henry VIII school. He has always been a keen sportsman and joined the Coventry club, which had once been graced by his International fly half father Ivor, after a good grounding in school's rugby.

Those of us who remember Peter as a rather frail looking youth when he first wore those of us with remember Peter as a rather traff tooking youth when he first wore the Coventry shirt were soon proved wrong by his performances on the field. He rapidly improved and continues to amaze with the strength of his tackling — who can forget his remarkable display of tackling for the Midland Counties West which destroyed the All Blacks midfield last year.

Peter has always been in favour of a "running" game and would be far happier to see the Coventry side run the ball more often, a sentiment with which many of us would agree. He prefers to play in the threequarter line rather than at fly half where he played some of his early rugby and is happiest at centre where he feels he is more in the heart of the game.

Rated as the high point of his career was the English victory in the World Sevens competition at Murrayfield earlier this year and he was particularly pleased with the victory over the Welsh Seven. He finds it very difficult to pick out one particular try as outstanding, preferring to remember them all, but I will venture to point out the importance of the first try he scored at Orrell in last year's Knock-Out cup which gave us a lead to defend until our final scoring burst. Unlike many of today's players he expresses a great enjoyment in playing County Rugby where he particularly enjoys the freedom of the play.

Outside the game he is a bachelor and his interests are generally sporting including fishing, squash and cricket amonst the most important.
