### WELCOME TO BRIDGEND

A game with Bridgend never lacks personalities nor intriguing moments, but unfortunately they only visit Kingsholm once every two years. And their last appearance here will not readily be forgotten, for they were one of the very few teams to have lowered Gloucester's colours at home in recent years.

It was on Monday, January 1, 1973, that the Welsh lads played sparkling rugby to win convincingly and deservedly by 14 - 6, with Gloucester's points coming from two penalty goals by Peter Butler. The Cherry and Whites rose to much greater heights last January, however, when they narrowly lost by 17 - 16 at the Brewery Field.

Gloucester, then, will be anxious for revenge this afternoon, and with Bridgend's reputation for speedy and constructive rugby we look forward to another enjoyable tussle.
