# MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT SOUTH AFRICAN RUGBY BOARD DR. D.H. GRAVEN

In a welcoming message to our visitors, the Gloucestershire Rugby Football Union for their first match in South Africa (they played in Rhodesia on Saturday) I must also congratulate their apponents North Eastern Cape on celebrating their tenth anniversary at Graaff-Reinet to-day.

In the first place Gloucestershire Rugby Football Union is a most illustrious county team as their history on the playingfield since in their inception in 1878 shows only too well. The South African Rugby Board has had a very close association with Gloucestershire: As long ago as 3 November 1906 our very first touring Springboks team that of Faul Roos, played against Gloucestershire at Gloucestershire and won 23-0; then on 28 December 1912 at Bristol Billy Millar Springboks am best Gloucestershire 11-0, followed by Bennie Osler Springboks on 23 October 1931 against Gloucestershire and Somerset (14-3).

The Western county team which lost 5-16 to Basil Kenyon Springboks on 12 January 1951 at Bristol had 6 Gloucestershire players. Ten Gloucestershire players were included in the Western County Team which lost 0-42 against Avril Malans Springboks on 10 December 1960. In 1969-70 against Dawie de Villiers team Western County gave there best performance against the Springboks drawing 3-3.

The friendship on and off the field between Gloucestershire and South African Rugby has spanned 70 years, which is a very long time.

We welcome Gloucestershire on their visit to South Africa, may they have an enjoyable tour making many friends, on and off the field and have the opportunity to display to us the brand of rugby which they are capable of playing.

On behalf of the South African Rugby Board my sincerest congratulations to the home Union who has had a difficult 10 years during which they have had hard times, many changes of their boundries and not all the success they would have liked on the field of playing. Now they seem to have made a breakthrough which aygurst well for the next 10 years. In fact this Union started as North Eastern Districts as long ago as 1903, yes 73 years ago and it was 10 years ago that at learston I met Mr. Tim Murray and Neville Turner where it was decided that Midland and Karoo Sub Union formerly with Eastern Frovince would amalgamate with North Eastern Districts to form a new and stronger Union.

May todays match be a victory for Rugby and the forerunner of many more matches between Gloucestershire and teams in and from South Africa.



How good is South African forward play in general and that of Northern Transvaal in particular? Northern Transvaal is looked upon as South Africa's birth-place of forward play and the nursery of forwards. It is to the North that the responsibility of taming the All Blacks will be given. Can they do this?

This afternoon's match — when Gloucestershire, English country champions meet Northern Transvaal, Currie Cup champions — will provide the answer.

Gloucestershire recently became English champions for the third consecutive year. Northern Transvaal have won the Currie Cup three years running. Like Northern Transvaal, Gloucestershire depended on their formidable forwards to conquer the crown. The same accusation which has been flung at Northern Transvaal has been directed at Gloucestershire — that they play hard, but unattractive, rugby.

If Northerns cannot bring the "West Country" forwards to their knees this afternoon, it bodes ill for our chances against the All Blacks.

Gloucestershire's strength is obvious from the names in their team.

The two best-known are that of John Pullin and Mike Burton, both of whom have been to South Africa before and both of whom played key rôles in England's unexpected victory over the Springboks in 1972 at Ellis Park.

Another member of that memorable pack is John Watkins, fair-haired flanker. Other England forwards in the touring side are Andy Brinn (lock), Barry Nelmes (prop) and eighth-man David Rollitt.

But don't pass over the Gloucestershire backs too readily. Alan Morley is a Lion wing and scored the winning try for England against the 'Boks in 1972. Centres Chris Williams and Peter Kingston have both played for England and have been playing in combination since their school days. Peter Butler, full-back, has proved his worth for England and has been top-scorer in England for the past three years.

John Bayliss, 34-year old Gloucestershire captain, will be remembered for his centre play against the Springboks in 1969—70.

During the last decade or so several British club and county teams have visited South Africa with only middling success. For many it was only a holiday at the expense of their hosts.

Gloucestershire may be counted the exception. On paper they are the strongest of these British sides and they are more serious in their approach to the tour than their predecessors were.

Gloucestershire has a proud record. Since their beginning in 1878 they have won the English country title thirteen times, reached the final 22 times and the semi-finals 30 times.

1. Nalmes, Barry George (Cardiff)
Prop. Nickname "Buller". Age 27. Height 6'2". Weight 17½ stone. Essentially a Bristol player becoming an "exilia" when he moved to Cardiff in the course of his employment. "Disappeared" from the first-class rugby scene for nearly two years, but returned to display all his old skills. Represented the Western Counties against three touring counties and the South of England against the All Blacks. Has appeared for the Barbarians and was capped for England against Australia last summer. A Sales Representative. Married with two sons.

Played for England in a National Association of Boys" Clubs International Match against Wales. Has represented South Western Counties and the South and South Western Counties against national touring sides. Has also played in two England Trials in 1974 and 1975. Tourde Mhodesia and South Africa with Public School Wanderers in May 1975. Represented British Police. Married with two children.





Pullein, John Vivian (Bristol)
 Hooker. Age 30. Height 5'11". Weight 14 st. 71 lb. Farmer. Holder of the record number of England Caps — 42. Toured Australia with England 1975. Made seven appearances for British Lions; three v. South Africa and four v. New Zealand. Married.



Powell, Roger Anthony (Llanelli)
 Lock. Age 29. Weight 16 st. 7 lbs. Height 6'4". Oil company Commercial Representative.
 The first Englishman to play for the famous Scarlets of Llanelli in thirty years. Married with two children.



3. Burton, Michael Alan (Gloucester)
Prop. Age 30. Height 62". Weight 16 st. 9 lbs. The current England prop, a British
Lion and a Barbanan. A member of the England party who toured Australia in 1975.
Has also represented Berkshire, the county of his birth, in the Championship. An irrepressible character; not only knows all the rugger songs, but says he wrote the majority
in his odd moments. Product of a local Gloucester school, Longlevens. An oil company
Sales Representative. Married.

Scrum-half. Age 24. Height 5'8". Weight 11 stone. Physical Education Teacher. Played in all of Gloucestershire's matches last season. In 1974 played in the County Championship for N. Midlands while living in the area. Formerly played for St. Paul's College, Lydney and Moseley before joining Gloucester last season on taking an appointment locally. Capped for England against Australia last summer and also previously represented England Schools under 19. Married.



13. Bayliss, John Alexander (Gloucester)

 Centre. Age 34. The Gloucestershire skipper. Has also led England in a Youth International.

11. Morley, Alan John George (Bristol)
Wing. Age 25. Height 510". Weight 13 stone. Current England winger. Began Rugby career with Bristol at age of 18 and has scored more than 125 tries for his club. Toured South African twice — with England 1972 and with the British Lions in 1974. Has scored over 20 tries for Gloucestershire. Toured Australia with England in 1975. Qualified Valuer and Auctioneer.



15. Bulter, Peter Edward (Gloucester)
Full Back. Age 24. Height 6'0". Weight 12 st. 2 lbs. In only his fourth season in firstclass rugby, and was the country's leading points scorer for three years. Generally
recognised as the "king of the place-kickers". Educated at Crypt School and Birmingham
University, where he was Rugby Captain. Played for U.A.U. and for S.W. Counties against
All Blacks and Australia. Was capped for England against Australia last summer and played




22. Mogg, Richárd (Gloucester)
