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CORDIAL WELCOME TO BRISTOL!

There are, of course, few more eagerly awaited club matches at Kingsholm than the annual fixture with our keen rivals and very good friends, Bristol — the other part of our highly successful County side, one might say — to whom we extend a particularly cordial welcome this afternoon.

It is unfortunate that both our great County clubs have been hit by injuries and illness so early in the season and there will be a few familiar faces missing. Indeed, Bristol's Dave Rollitt and John Pullin, together with Gloucester's John Haines and Phil Winnel have not yet played this season, while other stalwarts are still nursing recent injuries.

Nevertheless, the excitment and, we trust, the entertainment invariably associated with the matches between our clubs will continue unabated, both sides, no doubt, bearing in mind the exhortations of Hanry V to "stiffen the sinews, summon up the blood!"

Last season's match at Kingsholm was brought forward to Wednesday evening, January 24 of this year, and the thousands who saw it will not readily forget an incredible affair. Even the international referee, Ken Pattison — who had charge of last Wednesday's match with Japan — said he had never in his long career known so many

injuries in one game, with three players taken to hospital and eight others requiring treatment by the "Doc" to wounds of varying degrees.

Yet, as the referee also agreed, it was never a 'punch-up'; the injuries were mainly caused by the tough, even fierce, but legitimate approach of the players, who spared nothing in their efforts to win such a prestige contest. Perhaps we can say that honour was satisfied, for the result was a 15-15 draw.
