It was with great delight that every rugby supporter—except those whose loyalties lie with Weston-super-Mare—heard that Cheltenham, our old rivals and close neighbours who visit us this evening, had ended that depressingly long run of defeats with a narrow but deserved victory over the sea-side

club a week ago.

We offer them congratulations, though that satisfaction turned again to disappointment after their heavy defeat by Broughton Park last Saturday. It would be hypocrisy, then, to deny that the Town's fortunes are at an extremely low ebb, yet they reflect nothing but credit and admiration for their gallant skipper, Maurice Hamlin, and his gallant lads for their determination and dedication.

Sweet are the uses of adversity, Duke Senior tells us in "As You Like It", and our neighbours can take considerable comfort from the fact that they at least have the majority of the rugger enthusiasts watching for their results eagerly each week, almost will-

ing them to win.

Cheltenham are still in the process of re-building and have several young players of promise; it was a blow when one of their most experienced players, County full-back David Hughes, moved from the town and is no longer available to help in the reconstruction.

In the corresponding game at Kingsholm last season Gloucester romped to a resounding win by 52 points to nil on Monday evening, March 7; but again, Cheltenham can console themselves with the thought that they were only one of four sides—Bath, Abertillery and Guy's Hospital were the others—against whom the Cherry and Whites amassed over fifty points in successive home matches.

Despite their misfortunes the Town, perhaps mindful of the poet's words, "Say not the struggle naught availeth," have always insisted on contributing to an entertaining game. We wish them good fortune in the future and meanwhile look forward to the usually enjoyable tussle with them this evening.

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"Big Sam"

It was with profound sorrow that rugby followers everywhere heard of the death last week-end in a Birming-ham hospital of Sam Doble, the former Moseley and England fullback, at the tragically young age of 33. Although he invariably became the target for light banter from the Kingsholm crowd Sam was held in great respect by them as a very accomplished rugby full-back.

Sam first came into prominence when at St. Paul's College, Cheltenham, where he often played as a No. 8 forward and appeared in the pack against Gloucester United. But he soon took over the full-back berth and it is mainly as a prodigious placekicker that he will be best remem-

bered.

It is believed that his last game for Moseley was at Kingsholm on Wednesday, October 1, 1975, when he came into the side at the last minute in place of Richard Akenhead, who switched to fly-half when Martin Cooper dropped out of the side to play Gloucester.

Our supporters join with thousands of others who have watched Sam over the years in extending deepest sympathy to his family and to the Moseley club he served so faithfully.

Club Personalities No. 2 Peter Butler



Countless opponents over recent years have, like Hamlet, wished that "this too, too solid flesh would melt" as they have watched the prodigious goal - kicking feats of PETER EDWARD BUTLER, the club's vicecaptain, dash all hopes they may have cherished of victory over Gloucester.

Married in August of last year-on the day that West Indies played Gloucestershire, he recalls-Peter, a production service manager at a local chemical factory, created a record in Great Britain by scoring 574 points in a season. And in that season, 1973-74, he was rested from the Gloucester side that trounced Old Merchant Taylors on Boxing Day by 80 points!

Peter has made 21 championship appearances for Gloucestershire, missing all but two of last season's matches because of a prolonged thigh injury, and has played twice for England against France in Paris and, again as he fondly recalls, against Australia on the famous Sydney Cricket Ground!

Educated at Crypt School, the nursery for so many great players, he began with Old Cryptians before studying at Birmingham University, where he soon became the rugger captain and news of his remarkable placekicking ability came trickling through. Since then he has bestrode the rugby world like a Colossus.

In the summer, when he is not committed to a rugby tour, Peter plays cricket for Old Cryptians, as do several of his Gloucester colleagues, past and present.
