Cordial Welcome to 'Pool!

For the second successive mid-week game we extend a hearty welcome to opponents from "over the Bridge" with the visit here this evening of more old friends and rivals from Gwent, the lads from Pontypool.

With their famous front row, heralded in song by one Max Boyce, and equally distinguished skipper, Terry Cobner, all British Lions, the 'Pool are indeed formidable opponents and last season shared the honour with Gloucester of being one of the very few teams to beat the Welsh "merit table" champions, Newport.

Pontypool, unfortunately, are only met once each season on a home and away basis and, oddly enough, Gloucester have achieved extremely creditable victories at Pontypool Park — where few visiting sides win! — in recent years.

But our Gwent friends, mindful of the words of Byron that revenge is sweet, duly put matters better in perspective for themselves on their last appearance at Kingsholm on Wednesday, October 29, 1975, when they defeated the Cherry and Whites by 19 points to 12.

Gloucester in turn, then, will be anxious to avenge that defeat and we look forward to another entertaining game this evening, the while trusting 'Pool will enjoy their brief visit here!

Kingsholm Kackle County Match

Next Saturday brings the opening of the South-West group programme of the county championship when Gloucestershire meet Devon at Kingsholm, kick-off 3 p.m.

Meanwhile we congratulate all the Gloucester lads who have been selected for the County, knowing they will all be giving everything in the Gloucestershire cause, with an obvious eye on winning back the championship title they surrendered last season.

Rail Trips

British Rail have announced that they will be running special trips for Gloucestershire's next two matches in the South-West group, against Somerset at Bridgwater on October 22 and Cornwall at Camborne on the following Saturday, October 29.

Full details have been issued for the Somerset match. The train will leave Gloucester at 12.17, arriving at Bridgwater at 13.38. For the return journey supporters have the choice of two trains, the first leaving at 17.00 and arriving back at Gloucester at 18.30, the second departing at 18.16 and due back at 19.42.

The return fare is only £2.00 for adults and £1.50 for children. British Rail would appreciate bookings in advance if possible to help them in their arrangements and announce that the train will also leave Cheltenham for the same trip, though Cheltenham supporters are asked to make enquiries at their own railway station.

Details of the special trip to Camborne will be announced later, both in the press and our programme notes, but British Rail have already stated that the fare will be £5 — an extremely reasonable sum for a return journey of some 450 miles!
