Kingsholm Kackle County's Great Start

However, with the few changes that will undoubtedly be made, there is every cause for optimism that Gloucestershire will again be contending for the title they surrendered last season, though both their remaining matches are on "foreign" soil and current form suggests that Cornwall at Camborne will provide the sternest

Rail Trips

Mindful of the enthusiasm for county rugby, particularly in Gloucester and the surrounding wide area, British Rail have announced that they will be running special trips for both these South-West group matches, against Somerset at Bridgwater on

October 22 and the Cornwall game on Saturday October 29.

For the Somerset match the train will leave Gloucester at 12.17, arriving at Bridgwater at 13.38. Support of the strain of two trains. porters have the choice of two trains for the return journey, the first leaving at 17.00 and arriving back in Gloucester at 18.30, the second departing at 18.16 and due back at 19.42. Ample time to celebrate the victory in suitable manner or drown one's disappointment!

The return fare is only £2.00 for adults and £1.50 for children—and how satisfying it is to see the youngsters supporting club county! But British Rail would appreciate bookings in advance if possible to assist them in their arrangements. Cheltenham supporters are asked to make enquiries at their own railway station for details of

departure and return.

Details of the special trip to Camborne will be announced later, both in the press and our programme notes, but British Rail have already stated that the return fare will be only £5an extremely reasonable one for a return journey of some 450 miles!

U.S.A. Programmes

Club Personalities No. 4 Mike Burton

Genial, with a humorous twinkle often in his eye, yet probably the most controversial figure in the game today, MICHAEL ALAN BURTON is the most capped of Gloucester's current players, having made 15 appearances for England against all the home countries and France, Australia and South Africa.

Married, with two sons and a daughter, Mike was educated at Longlevens School and joined Glou-



cester from Longlevens R.F.C. His first game for the Cherry and Whites' senior side was against Moseley in November, 1964.

A British Lion, he has played for South-West Counties against every major touring side, has made eight appearances for Barbarians, and the game against Devon at Kingsholm last Saturday was his 36th for Gloucestershire.

His wife has seen little of him in the summer months, for Mike has made six successive major overseas tours with the Lions, England, Gloucestershire and, this year Gloucester

cestershire and, this year Gloucester. But Mike is nothing if not forthright and makes no secret of the fact that he has been ordered off no fewer than four times in first-class matches. "All very controversial," he added, with that twinkle again in his eye, "but let's be honest about it!"

In fact, Mike is the only Englishman in the history of the game to have been sent off in an international match, but even then, it was obvious that he was more sinned against than sinning, and this was recognised when he escaped with only a mild sentence. It happened in a Test against Australia at Brisbane in 1975.

A "likeable rogue", as someone once termed him, Mike, according to many shrewd observers and far more who have played against him, is the finest tight-head prop in rugby today. He has served Gloucester, county and country faithfully for many years and still only just the "wrong side of 30," looks forward to several more seasons in the game he loves.
