Welcome to Nottingham

Making new friends is an important part of everyday life and this is equally applicable in our great game of rugger, which is why we extend a particularly warm welcome this afternoon to comparative newcomers to Kingsholm in Nottingham, who were founded, incidentally, exactly 100 years ago, though they celebrated their centenary last season.

Although old records show that the Midland club met Gloucester at the Spa towards the end of the last century, this is only their third visit to Kingsholm, their last two both being

on New Year's Day.

On their first appearance here on January 1, 1975, Nottingham proved that effort is the highest common factor in every successful enterprise, for they surprised Gloucester and supporters alike by deservedly winning an entertaining game by 19 points to 15.

But on the first day of 1976 the Cherry and Whites duly avenged that defeat with victory by 17 - 3 and last season, on Tuesday, April 19, 1977, visited Ireland Avenue to win a high-scoring game by 29 points to 18.

Hillaire Belloc wrote of the Midlands as "being sodden and unkind," but that certainly does not apply to the good folk who live there and we look forward to another exciting tussle with our Nottingham friends this afternoon, trusting they enjoy their brief stay in our own fair city!



No. 7 Eddie Pinkney

It is unusual, to say the least, for a Gloucester rugby player to have had little enthusiasm for the game while still at school; yet EDWARD ARTHUR PINKNEY did not begin to take an interest in its gentle arts until he was 18 years old, when he was invited to reveal those hidden talents with local club All Blues.

Perhaps realising somewhat belatedly what he had been missing, Eddie soon began to blossom forth and after a short spell with his original club, moved to Matson—his "home" club in a manner of speaking—where he quickly established himself as a No. 8 forward of exceptional ability with his powerful running.



Eddie, a welder with Gloster Saro, Ltd., is married with two sons, Robert and Richard—but he did not see Richard until he was several weeks old, for he was born during the past summer while his father was on the American tour with the Gloucester club.

Educated at Kingsholm School, Eddie learned his rugby while with Matson. He made his debut for Gloucester's senior side against Newbridge at Kingsholm five seasons ago, immediately stamping his mark on affairs with his forthright approach to attacking play.

It is a travesty of justice that he has made only one appearance for Gloucestershire, despite the high esteem in which he is held by the selectors, but has generally been forced on to the replacements' bench or the "reserves" list by international Dave Rollitt.

Eddie, however is philosophical about it all; he is still a young man and those honours which have eluded him may yet come his way!
