## Club Personalities No. 8 John Haines

Many supporters have undoubtedly seen on occasions a small van hurtling round the city with "Happy Henry" printed on it; but some may not know that this depicts its owner. JOHN HENRY HAINES, the highly industrious and speedy Gloucester openside wing forward. For John is a wholesale meat caterer.

—Educated at the Crypt School he joined Gordon League — a school and a club that have produced many great Gloucester players — and quickly made his mark on the local scene as a back row forward of exceptional ability. While still a youngster with the League he skippered the England Boys' Clubs international team which completed the double over Wales some ten years ago.



Married, "with four dogs", as he jocularly puts it, John has played nearly 300 games for Gloucester's senior side, despite the fact that knee and back injuries sadly restricted his appearances last season, when he did not play in a single match for the County. Indeed, it was thought that his playing career might be finished but fortunately for club and county, he made a remarkable recovery during the past summer.

"Happy Henry" made his senior debut for Gloucester in the match against Ebbw Vale nine seasons ago at Kingsholm. He has been on two tours, with Gloucestershire to South Africa and his club last summer in America.

John's County appearances include championship finals against Lancashire and Eastern Counties and though the highest honours of an England cap have eluded him, he has three times been selected as reserve for international matches. Now back in the successful Gloucestershire side and in splendid form perhaps he may at last gain recognition!
