Warm Welcome to Abertillery

This evening we extend a very warm welcome to Abertillery and a return to mid-week rugger at Kingsholm. Our visitors, who are comparative newcomers over the past decade, are only met once a season, on a home and away basis, and the last two meetings between the clubs have produced significant results.

For on their last appearance at Kingsholm, on Wednesday, March 16. 1977, our Gwent friends were in the middle of a remarkably successful and high-scoring run by Gloucester, who won four consecutive home

matches by over 50 points.

Abertillery fell victims to the Cherry and Whites by 51 points to 4, but they can derive considerable comfort perhaps from the fact that Cheltenham, Guy's Hospital and Bath also conceded the half-century.

But revenge came sweetly and swiftly for Abertillery last year at the Park, where they were the only club to beat Gloucester in the whole of the second half of last season. True, the Cherry and Whites were far from full strength as they were due to play their John Player Cup game on the following Saturday, but victory by the "Green and Whites" by 12 points to 6 was fully deserved.

We look forward then to another entertaining and absorbing game with Abertillery this evening, trusting they

enjoy their brief stay.

Club Personalities No 6 Gordon Hudson

There can be no better known nor popular figure in the Gloucester Rugby club than its present chairman,

ARTHUR GORDON HUDSON, son of the late Arthur Hudson who, together with great names such as Tom Voyce and "Doc" Alcock, helped to make the Cherry and Whites one of the most famous in the game of rugby throughout the world.

Like so many gifted sportsmen of his era Gordon's chances of being at the top for many years were cruelly curtailed by the advent of World War II, for he joined the Gloucester club from Old Cryptians in season 1936-37 as a wing three-quarter—with limited success, he modestly adds. But he was "tactfully" persuaded to try his luck in the pack by Roy "Digger" Morris.

He was an instant success as a flanker and was a regular in the Cherry and Whites' senior side the following season until the outbreak of hostilities. During the war he played for the Royal Air Force in their Inter-Services matches and in several games against Northern League teams for war charities.

Gordon also appeared for the English Services in 12 war-time internationals against Wales, Scotland and France, recalling that his most satisfying game was against Scotland at Murrayfield, where he scored four tries.

He won his first Gloucestershire cap when the county championship restarted in 1946 and made 39 appearances, during which he skippered the County for two seasons. Although no caps were awarded he gained the coveted England jersey when he played against the famous Kiwis at Twickenham in the first "Victory International" and in the same season was selected for the Barbarians.

Gordon, who was also an accomplished cricketer and is a member of Gloucestershire C.C.C., made over 300 appearances for Gloucester, whom he skippered for three seasons. He retired in 1954 and was elected to the committee the following year.

Honoured by his election as the club chairman in season 1972-73, Gordon rates his produest moments as those when "the lads" won the cup in the inaugural year of the com-petition and again last season. He is now a life member and vice-president of Gloucester R.F.C. and has also served on the Gloucestershire executive committee for many years.
