Club Personalities No. 7 John Orwin

Some clubs, especially those in the soccer world, hold an annual ballot among their supporters to find the most improved player of the season. Were such a gimmick perpetrated in the Gloucester Rugby Club the award this year would undoubtedly go to

our popular and industrious lock forward JOHN ORWIN, who never seems to give even a mediocre performance.

John was born—alas, one can almost hear supporters sigh—in Bradford, Yorkshire, where he lived until he was 17 years old, when he joined the Royal Air Force as an aircraft mechanic. It seems almost impossible to believe, but he had never played rugby before his first posting to Thorney Island in Hampshire. There must have been unbounded latent talent in "Big John".

His first position was at full-back, where he learned to kick goals and though he has had little opportunity of practising this art with such an accomplished performer as Peter Butler in the team, there have been occasions when supporters have seen him "plonk them over" from long range.

It was when he moved to Marham in Norfolk that John really began to show that he was decidedly more than just another rugby player and earned somewhat higher recognition at minor county level. But it was his posting to Brize Norton, from where he joined Gloucester in 1976, that put him in the top flight.

John is currently playing for the R.A.F. as a tight head prop but frankly admits he much prefers to be in the second row or No. 8—but at least this proves his versatility. He has been an automatic choice for Oxfordshire and has played for Southern Counties against Argentine and for Combined Services when they met the Kiwis.

Being a Yorkshirman, perhaps, accounts for his love of cricket and John, who was 25 last month, says he "rather fancies himself" as a mediumfast bowler, though he is equally adept at basket-ball and squash. He has been married for nearly two years but as yet there are no little Orwins displaying their prowess with rugby ball or cricket bat.

We all hope there will be no more postings for John in his R.A.F. career—unless it is to somewhere near Gloucester, which would qualify him for our own county—for on those occasions he is unable to play the Cherry and Whites' pack undoubtedly miss his skills and power.
