Particularly encouraging was the form of two teen-agers, Paul Ford, elder son of Peter, and John Brain, a lock forward, who were both making their senior debuts. And where more satisfying for these lads than achiev-

ing this at headquarters!

Nor should we forget the other talented lads who have still not attained their majority, if we can regard the age of 21 as this milestone—Malcolm Preedy and John Gadd, who also played at Twickenham, and Mike Teague. Those supporters who thought Gloucester's forward power over the years was on the wane will no doubt be revising their ideas!

United's 300!

It may have gone unnoticed by their ever-increasing band of supporters that Gloucester United, with their excellent win over Richmond Vikings last Saturday, passed the 300 points' mark — a remarkable achievement after only 11 matches which have included such tough opposition as Berry Hill, Cleve, and the "second strings" of Coventry, Bristol and Bedford!
