Forthcoming Attractions

With several key players in the Gloucestershire side on Saturday the Cherry and Whites face a tough assignment when they entertain Nottingham for the last home game of the month, kick-off as usual at 3.00 p.m. The senior side will then be away until Saturday week, November 10, when Plymouth Albion will be the visitors to Kingsholm.

Normally the Plymouth match would have counted in the South-West Merit Table, but as this date coincides with Gloucestershire's county championship game with Devon at Bristol, the Rugby Union have ruled that such fixtures are ordinary club ones and will have no effect on the merit table positions.

This new procedure is in accordance with the new R.F.U. Divisional Merit Tables Rules, paragraph 4(d)—on Page 114 for those who have access to this season's Rugby Union handbook. It states, "Where a club has more than three players playing for a representative side (i.e. County Championship match, Divisional match or National Trial or International match) on the day of a scheduled match, that club shall, prior to the match, have the right to elect that the match shall not count in the Table concerned."

If you can't understand that load of unmitigated verbosity you're not alone. But briefly it means that if Gloucester or Plymouth have more than three of their players participating in the county championship game on the same day, either side can claim their club match shall not count as a

merit table one.
