Welcome to the Irish Lads!

"Rarely, rarely, comest thou," wrote the poet Shelley, and this could well apply to London Irish, our popular visitors this afternoon, whom Gloucester, unfortunately, meet only once each season on the home and away basis, making their appearance the more welcome.

Even more frustratingly the Cherry and Whites have so often in recent years been forced to meet the powerful Irish when their ranks have been decimated by Gloucestershire calls or

other representative matches.

On their last visit here, on Saturday, November 26, 1977, the Irish won a closely-contested game by 9 - 6. one of several successive victories for them. But Gloucester were able to put the overall picture into better focus last year when they won at Sunbury by the equally narrow margin of 12 - 10.

This afternoon, however, with no County demands. Gloucester are able to field at nearly full strength; but while mindful of the admirable sentiments of Prospero in "The Tempest" that the rarer action is in virtue than in vengeance the lads will be determined to erase a few memories of those defeats by the Irish to whom we extend a very warm welcome.

Kingsholm Kackle The Semi-Final

Gloucestershire, as most supporters know, meet North Midlands at the Reddings, Moseley, in the semi-final of the county championship on Saturday, December 8; and they will have a score to settle, for it was North Midlands who defeated them in the final two seasons ago.

As Gloucester have no match on this day—(see "Bath Change" below)—the Reddings will no doubt be reverberating to the famous, "Kingsholm roar." Raucous, even frightening to the opposition, but highly efficacious as far as Gloucestershire are

concerned!

Visitors to the Oxford City By-pass ground for last Saturday's quarterfinal again had it brought home forcibly to them that Kingsholm supporters are spoiled; in other words, there are few clubs with such a magnificent ground and splendid accomodation. We mention this because some of those who require grandstand tickets for the semi-final may be disappointed.

Tickets will shortly be available at £2.00 (reserved) for the Centre Stand and £1.50p for the Wing Stands and the smaller stand on the other side of

the ground.

Bath Change

An important fixture change brings Gloucester without a match in a fortnight's time, Saturday, December 8, the date of the County championship semi-final. As supporters will know from their lists, the Cherry and Whites were due to meet Bath—unbeaten by an English club this season—at Kingsholm.

But this would not have counted as a South-West merit table match as Gloucester will certainly have more than three players — the number stipulated under the new Rugby Union ruling — in the County team

to meet North Midlands.

Bath kindly agreed to postnone the fixture and travel to Kingsholm for a mid-week match and this, pending confirmation, will now be played on the following Monday. December 10 with the usual kick-off at 7.00 p.m.
