Warm Welcome to the Wasps!

An entomologist who knows nothing of rugger might regard this as an ephemeral gathering of hymenopterans — (to those who do not make a study of insects this means a transitory visit of wasps) — but it is far from being a strange invitation to those revolting creatures which plague us during the warmer months of our fickle climate.

Instead, it is a very sincere welcome to the famous London club, the Wasps, who so readily agreed to visit Kingsholm this evening because of the televised international match tomorrow afternoon.

Unfortunately, those black jerseys with the golden wasps upon them are only seen normally at Kingsholm once every two years, the annual matches between our two clubs being on an alternate home and away basis, Indeed, we might almost quote the poet Shelley — rarely, rarely, comest thou!

Last Saturday the Wasps were narrowly beaten in their high-scoring away game with powerful Liverpool, but they are enjoying a successful season, having won 13 of their 21 matches. The fixture with Wasps at Sudbury last January fell victim to the arctic weather, but when they visited Kingsholm two years ago, on Saturday, January 21, 1978, Gloucester won an entertaining tussle by 26 points to 12. We look forward to another such intriguing game this evening, trusting our London friends enjoy their brief stay in our fair city!

Kingsholm Kackle John Player Cup

Next week-end, of course, brings the first round of the money-spinning John Player Cup competition, though Gloucester will be, in a way, the "odd man out." For they meet Richmond at the Athletic Ground on Sunday, January 27, as the ground is required on the Saturday for the cup game between London Scottish and our local junior champions, Matson.

British Rail, fully alive to the tremendous support enjoyed by the Cherry and Whites, will be running a special train for the match, as previously announced in these notes and in the press. It will leave Gloucester at 9 a.m., arriving at Richmond Station at 12 noon, leaving ample time for lunch and other refreshment before the kick-off.

Supporters will not be left to ruminate and cogitate, or generally muse over events — at least, not in Richmond — for the train will leave on the return journey at 4.30 p.m., arriving back at Gloucester between 7.30 and 7.45 p.m.

The return fare is only £4.70p — £3.10p for juniors under 14 — but those wishing to take advantage of this extraordinarily cheap trip are asked to book in advance if possible, for there will certainly be no shortage of supporters.

Coaches will also be running from Kingsholm for the match, both leaving at 10.30 a.m., but with the cost at a mere £3.00 business has been as brisk as what the musician might term "allegro." (In his language meaning fast and lively, not the chorus girls' line-up!).

Our supporters will by now be well aware that because of the archaic Sunday Observance Law, tickets will not be issued for this Cup game, so it is pointless to apply. Instead admission will be by programme, £1.00p each, with an extra 50p for entrance to the main stand. As the train and coaches should arrive at least two hours before the kick-off, it seems good advice to purchase stand tickets immediately on arrival, taking it in turns to reserve your seats while your pals pop out for a "quickie or two."

But there is a special note for all members who wish to partake of refreshment, before or after, at the Richmond club — they must ensure that they have their Gloucester R.F.C. season tickets on their persons. Richmond have announced that this rule will be strictly adhered to and we would add that a Gloucester R.F.C. Social Club membership card will NOT produce the "open sesame"!

... And The County Final

Still very much on the proverbial ball, British Rail have also announced details of a special trip for the county championship final between Lancashire and Gloucestershire at the Vale of Lune ground on Saturday, February 9 — and another excellent bargain, it appears!

The train will leave Gloucester at 9.15 a.m., arriving at Lancaster, from where it is easy access to the Vale of Lune ground, at 12.25. For the return journey the departure time from Lancaster is 5.20 p.m., arriving back in Gloucester at 8.35 p.m.

The cost? Only £4.90 and £3.40 for

juniors! But again, it is advisable to book seats in advance, as there will undoubtedly be numerous "takers" at this extremely reasonable price.

Supporters are asked to note, however, that in view of this competitive price no coaches will be run from Kingsholm for the final, as the lowest quotation exceeds the rail fare.
