"COME ON YOU ELVER EATERS!"

Here we are — at last — at the start of a new season. Somehow, a thoroughly wet Summer makes the gap between Rugby matches seem even longer.

No doubt we shall have our triumphs and our frustrations (remember Rosslyn Park?), but we can, as always, be sure that no team that comes to Kingsholm will have an easy ride.

This year, we have a new Captain in Steve Mills, and a new Coach in Dick Smith. We even have a new format for the programme. Some things don't change, however. If you look around you will see the same supporters, occupying the same spots, making the same remarks, and probably telling the same jokes as last year. In fact, some of them have been in the same place for so long, that one wonders if the Committee goes around every April and throws dust sheets over them 'til September.

Last year's record, (Won — 35, Lost — 12, Drawn — 3, Points For — 884, Points Against — 464) didn't actually represent a vintage season, but was still a record that many good-class clubs would be very glad to achieve.

So let's start the year by wishing everyone who runs out on the Sacred Turf, be they First Team, United, Colts or whatever, the best of Kingsholm luck for a happy, victorious and injury-free season.

Why not make a proper job of it?

If you're more than an occasional visitor to Kingsholm, it makes good economic sense to consider becoming a Patron, or buying a Season Ticket. In fact, you've only got to watch about a dozen games to be in pocket over paying at the gate each match. Rates this year are as follows:

Patron (Includes admission to Centre Stand and a free Car Park ticket) £18.00.

Wing Stand £12.00.

Ground £9.00.

For Senior Citizens, Former Players and Scholars (Under 17), there are special rates:

Centre Stand £9.00 Wing Stand £6.00. Ground £4.50.

There's another point too. Becoming a Patron, or buying a Season, (except for Scholars), entitles you to free membership of the Social Club, on obtaining the appropriate card. And that's got to be the best place in Gloucester to talk Rugby over a beer or two. Sometimes, you even get to drink with the Referee!

Finally, it's about the best way to give the Club your support — and if you weren't interested in doing that, you probably wouldn't be here anyway. So why not do all your paying now? It's cheaper in the long run.

Nice to see you Broughton Park

Some Clubs start their season with a nice gentle pipe-opener. We don't — we take on Broughton Park, who have been very valued, and respected, opponents over the last few years. It's a pity that a congested fixture list only allows us to see them at Kingsholm every other year, but that makes them even more welcome when they do come.

Last year, the away fixture resulted in a win for Gloucester, 16-9. Peter Butler's trusty right boot supplied four penalties, and Lewis Dick scored the first try of the season.

Of course, anything can happen in the season's first match, and our visitors from up North will, no doubt, be doing all they can to see that it does.

Welcome Park! We're looking forward to the game immensely.

Looking ahead

The next First Team home game is in a fortnight's time, when we entertain another respected team from the North— Waterloo. You don't have to wait a whole two weeks to see some decent Rugby at Kingsholm, however.

Next week, United — surely the most feared 'reserve' side in the country — entertain Coventry Extra First, which makes their first game at home a stern encounter. On Monday 15th, the United campaign continues with a visit from the other end of the Golden Valley, Cheltenham — and you know that form doesn't always mean everything in 'local Derby' meetings of that sort.

On the other hand, none of the three forthcoming Gloucester 'away' matches are prohibitive, in terms of distance. It's only a trip up the road to Stroud (Wednesday, Sept. 10th), while next Saturday it might well be worthwhile going to see if Coventry avenge that desperate last-kick win of Brian Russell's in the John Player last season. Or the trip to Ebbw Vale on Wednesday 17th might be worth making.

All this makes it even more sad that Phil has had quite a serious illness, unconnected with his injury, since coming home, and has been in hospital. The last we heard, he hopes to be 'on the scene' again in November — just in time for the National Trials.

We're all rooting for you Phil — get well soon, and start wearing that England shirt again, as well as the Cherry and White.
