The point is that we are down to play the mighty Bridgend on that day, here at Kingsholm, and the Gloucester Committee — rightly in my view — has decided that there is no way in which they are going to muck the Welshmen about if the fixture cannot be easily rearranged. After all, they were booked first for Kingsholm, and no doubt, have their own domestic problems to sort out first.

If things can be arranged satisfactorily between the two clubs, then all well and good. If not, then — well, we're sorry.

We wouldn't wish to get into the situation of — say — Leicester, who don't have any players worth mentioning playing County Rugby. And look what that has done to Leicestershire football, in spite of being the home of what has been the leading club in England for the last few years.

My own view (a purely personal one, not necessarily shared by anyone in an official position), is that we already have a perfectly good England Trial system, if it is used properly. It's called the County Championship. So why fiddle about with artificial nonsenses like the

However, as long as the Powers that Be insist on regarding them as the 'official' stepping stone to England recognition, who can blame players for wanting to play in them?

One thing's for sure. Something has to be done soon.
