three penalties.

We were supposed to meet them again on December 22nd, but the match had to be called off - due, if memory serves, to the weather.

New Year's Day sees our return visit to Moseley, which won't be an easy way to start 1981. But however that turns out, it would be hard to think of more appropriate visitors for the first match after Hogmanay at Kingsholm, than London Scottish, who are here next Saturday.
