After losing last year's magnificent final against a Lancashire team who achieved all manner of new peaks in 1980, the West countrymen hope to go one better today against Northumberland.

In fact if they succeed an even bigger battle is expected after the final whistle. There is now something tangible to display - the handsome Thorn Trophy - for victory. Where will it go?

Gloucestershire, confident after last year's near miss have already worked out a rota for Clubs to display the Thorn Trophy in their showcases, but Steve Gustard, the competitive Northumberland captain, suggests there will be no disharmony after the match as he will be taking the trophy back with him to Newcastle.

They have a strong case as they beat the defending champions Lancashire 9 - 7 at Gosforth in November and managed to upset Surrey 12 - 6 in the semi-final without really playing well.

It is no surprise that the finalists come from the two areas where the Championship really means something. They cannot understand the attitude of the other areas who wedge in county fixtures on any convenient Wednesday afternoon or squeeze them in under floodlights.

They stage their matches proudly on Saturdays. All the games generate tremendous enthusiasm. If anybody stands at Redruth for a Cornwall-Devon game or somewhere like Otley for a Yorkshire-Lancashire confrontation, the theory that the only passion in Rugby is found at Cardiff Arms Park is shown up as just so much nonsense.


And the intense rivalry will persist no matter what boundary changes the faceless civil servants in Whitehall force upon us all. My own county Middlesex do not even exist officially. Tell that to Northumberland because they lost 19-6 to them two years ago at Twickenham!

If all other counties adopted a similar approach to the North and South-West, the current proposals to downgrade the championship would have been stifled at birth.

Let's hope today's game matches the standard of last year's epic at the picturesque Vale of Lune ground even though it had rained non-stop for a week.



Gloucestershire RFU extends grateful thanks to the Gloucester club for their co-operation in staging this important game. It's worth pointing out that Gloucester have had to rearrange a fixture against no less a club than Bridgend to do so.

And that speaks for itself.

# Invaders from the North

Today, Gloucestershire contest their 25th County Final, Northumberland their 5th. Gloucestershire are looking for their 14th Championship, while Northumberland will be doing all they can to win their second.

That sort of statistic doesn't mean a lot, however. County Rugby takes very little account of past performances, and is no respecter of personal or team reputations. Anyone who was at the Vale of Lune Final last year will agree that any team that can beat Lancashire must be a team to be reckoned with.

Furthermore, the Northumberland side is built around the Gosforth Club, and we know a bit about them in this neck of the woods, so it doesn't seem likely that Gloucestershire's task today will be one whit less difficult than it was last year.

In fact, Northumberland's record of success in the County Championship goes back even further than Gloucestershire's. They won the title as long ago as 1891, by beating the Midlands at Coventry. Gloucestershire did manage a semi-final in 1891, losing to Lancashire (!), but didn't appear in a Final again until 1902, when they lost 9—3 to Durham.

It appears that Devon were the West Country heroes, in those days They did, in fact, beat Northumberland in the Final, in Newcastle in 1899. Devon were the stumbling block again in 1912, when they beat Northumberland at Devonport. The most recent Final contested by today's visitors was in 1936, when they lost 13-6 to Hampshire.

Gloucestershire's first Championship was gained as the result of a win over Yorkshire in 1910. The 13th was in 1976, when Peter Butler helped to beat Middlesex 24 points to 9.

Many past and present players and officials will well remember the last time Gloucestershire and Northumberland met. It was in the Semi-Finals of 1970-71, and although Gloucestershire eventually squeaked home by 9 points to 6, it wasn't without an uncomfortable amount of anxious moments.

On paper, and otherwise, today's match looks evenly balanced. In fact, all looks set fair for an enthralling game.

Let's sit back and enjoy it.

### Thanks to Thorn
