Keep it in the Family

One of the reasons why Gloucestershire seem to have a permanent place in the County Final, while having — well, difficulty let's say — in scraping through the South West Group, is that we have more consistently worthwhile opposition than virtually any other County. And one of the reasons for that is, that Somerset rely very heavily on Bath for their side.

This afternoon's visitors must surely represent one of the most successful English sides of the last few years, with among other things, very creditable runs in the last few John Players. Indeed, a look at the results from recent Gloucester v. Bath matches — usually with Merit Table implications - reveals a set of very memorable games, with the results defying most pre-match pundits.

Last season, Bath came here on December 10th, and came second by 10 points to 3. Bob Clewes scored a try, and Peter Butler kicked two penalties. The reverse fixture was played as late as March 26th, and Bath turned the tables with a vengeance, winning 24-9. Steve Boyle

motored over the line, and Peter Butler duly obliged with a penalty and a conversion.

This season, Gloucester went down the A46 on December 13th, and came away with a very creditable 19-0 win, but the recent record doesn't suggest that that proves anything. International stand-off John Horton wasn't playing, and was replaced by Dr. Charles Ralston of Gloucestershire Royal Hospital, who much prefers to play full back, these days.
