Tough challenge tonight

It's an odd thing, but whereas many Kingsholm regulars can give you chapter and verse about Gloucester's results against most Welsh clubs over the past few seasons, they sometimes have trouble recalling details about encounters with Newbridge, who are with us tonight. Perhaps the fact that we only see them at Kingsholm every other year has something to do with it.

Whatever the reason, however, it does tonight's visitors less than justice. In fact, their results against Gloucester recently have been quite as good as any other Welsh side can claim.

Last season, for example, we came away from our visit to Newbridge on the wrong end of an 18-9 scoreline. Their last raid on Kingsholm turned out to be a very close run thing, ending in a 9-9 draw - and we should not have done as well as that if Peter Butler hadn't had one of his nights, contributing all Gloucester's points by the penalty route.

Newbridge's results so far this year don't indicate that they are any less of a tough proposition than usual. They gave Bridgend quite a fright a week or two ago, and last Saturday were unlucky to lose by the odd point in a match with Aberavon which ended up 17-16.

So tonight's game represents a real challenge — but then, what else do we ever expect from opponents from Newbridge's neck of the woods?

So welcome to Newbridge - our second Welsh fixture in five days. Let's just hope that the weather, which marred the Pontypridd game, is just a little kinder tonight.
