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Is this Oxford's year?

There is also the fact that Gloucester is one of the very few clubs who play both major Universities during the run-up to Twickenham, so we are in the unusual position of being able to assess both teams in advance. So far, this season, the omens are good for today's visitors. The result against the Australians was an excellent one, and with just a little more luck, they might have pulled off the shock of the season.

I notice that, last weekend, Oxford University had a good away win against Northampton, who had just conquered an admittedly weakened, Leicester side, while Cambridge was taking a 30-point beating, on their own ground, at the hands of Richmond.

Last season, Gloucester stole the show at Oxford in a 27-3 win. On their last visit to Kingsholm, it was a much closer affair, which ended up as a 16 - 12 win for the home side, Bob Clewes scoring two tries, one of which was converted by Peter Butler, who (naturally), also kicked two penalties.

There's no doubt that Oxford has been considerably strengthened by the arrival of Derek Wyatt. At the time of writing, I don't know if the ex-Bedford, Bath, Eastern Counties and England winger is playing today, but a mature student of his capabilities must be a very valuable asset for a University side.

Good to see you again Oxford University — and, whatever today's result — good luck at Twickenham.
