Long time, no see!

It's odd that, although today's game has acquired the status of a match that no right-minded Kingsholm man would willingly miss, it hasn't, in fact, been played for four years! Certainly, Moseley have been here since then, and we've been to The Reddings, but the New Year's Day fixture has been bedevilled by the frost, and has not taken place.

So welcome Moseley. We couldn't ask for better visitors on New Years Day.

Let's face it, we can't grumble about the standard of entertainment we've had at Kingsholm in 1981. There were some excellent wins at the end of last season, and this year — well, you know all about that.

I suppose, if one had to pin-point the most satisfying achievement, so far this year, pride of place must go to the defeat of five Welsh teams, in four weeks, including the mighty Pontypool and a very big Newport side.

Taking Leicester's scalps on their own patch also has to be a highlight, as does the defeat,

Also, spare a thought for Steve Boyle. Surely, it's only the fact that he is at his peak in the era of the great Bill Beaumont that deprives him of a chance for International honours. After all, any lock who scores as many tries as Steve, must have something going for him.

Steve Baker couldn't be blamed for feeling a little aggrieved, either. Last season, he was approaching the status of heir apparent to Steve Smith — England reserve, stand-by for Argentina.
