YOU RANG SIR?

The Patron of our club resides in Gloucestershire in a rather nice cottage called Badminton House. His Grace The Duke of Beaufort still rides to hounds in much the same spirit as our Athletic Natch Secretary, John Dentus, rides to work on his bike. The Duke entertained members of the Club in Centenary year and we did not see a butler anywhere. Just a lot of horses and some very nice people.

There is still a butler at Arundel where the Duke of Norfolk at anges first class cricket matches. During one local game the Duke's butler substituted for an absentee umpire. A bowler had the temerity to appeal for l.b.w. against the Duke. All eye-brows were lifted, arched, and raised for the butler was the umpire carrying the responsibility. "Well, is he out?" asked the bowler. A pause and then the butler lifted his eyes to heaven and also his arm to reply diplomatically, "His Grace is not in." Nice one.

His job was not in jeopardy for butlers are rare as our visitors will confirm. Their most noble servant and super butler for ten years has just retired and while Gloucester will miss him, opponents will not. Aged 31, Peter Butler, has left the game. He played twice for England, against Australia in 1975 and France in 1976. In ten years he scored more than 3500 points and was the first player to total 1000 points in consecutive seasons. He scored 438 in 1972-3 and 574, a British record, in 1973-74. Two years later he scored all Gloucestershire's 24 points which beat Middlesex in the English County Championship.

Peter's successor in the Gloucester side is Paul Ford, son of Peter Ford, now Fixture Secretary and once a very fine and durable forward. When Gloucester beat Newport 14-3 in October 1963, Peter Ford did so well he was picked for the first England trial. He was in his 12th year with Gloucester and was 31 years of age. England selectors approved of experience for they also chose hooker Sam Hodgson and he was 35! Peter was uncapped at that time but played four times for England in 1964.

He did well for Western Counties against the 1963-4 All-Blacks and was a contemporary of Gloucester's great hooker and character, Mike Nicholls. A year later Mike Burton played his first game for Gloucester. Since then he has played for England and the Lions and now writes revealing yarns as well as arranging tours.

It's surprising who you meet on those tours. On the first — and still hazy — afternoon of our tour in Canada we met officials of the England party who were due to meet Canada East in Toronto. One was the coahing King of English rugby, Don Rutherford another in a long line of great Gloucester full backs. He played fourteen times for England from 1960-1967 and is a product of St. Lukes College, Exeter. Another ex-Lukes boy is our coach Chris Padfield. That proves useful on trips to Torquay, an old stamping ground for St. Lukes's men with a week-end pass. It's very handy to have an old hand who knows where the best art galleries, cinemas and milk hars are

If Peter Butler often "did" us when we met Gloucester with his kicking so did Don Rutherford. he captained Gloucester when we played there in October 1967. An experimental law prohibiting direct kicking to touch outside the then 25 yard line was being tried at the time. Nick Foice got Gloucester's try while we scored two by David Finch and winger Gareth Davies. Barry Edwards converted one but Don Rutherford landed three penalty goals and we lost 12-8. He also hit the posts with two shots at penalty goals!

Last season Gloucester played 48 games, won 41, drew 4 and only lost three. They amassed 1045 points and conceded 338. They reached the John Player Cup Final but had to share the trophy with Moseley after a 12-12 draw in extra time. predictably Gloucester's points came via their full back, Paul Ford, who had been preferred to Peter Butler for the final.

There may be other interests in the City of Gloucester but we do not know them. Rugby football is the bread, butter, steak and beer for the local manhood. There are also enthusiastic lady supporters of the Cherry and Whites who drive their side on. We live in neighbouring counties, each with great rugby traditions and it's quite easy to travel to each other's grounds.

Two famous Gloucester forwards who travelled to our ground for special matches are well remembered for their interest and sporting spirit. In September 1958, George Hastings, thirteen times an England prop, played for the Ken Jones XV when we opened our bottom stand. A dozen years later we held a match in memory of Wilf Hunt who died when Secretary of the Club after a distinguished playing career for Ebbw Vale. Mike Burton, 17 caps, carne down and played his part in a great game. Hastings and Burton may be remembered for their internationals but we have affection for them in an equially important sphere of the game.

Don Rutherford had Gloucester prop Phil Blakeway with him in Canada and we saw him play against Canada East who were scalped 52-3 in Toronto. We did not see any Indians on our travels but there must have been one hiding in our hotel. Whoever it was scalped our baggageman Glyn Tarr who literally went topless for the rest of the trip. Glyn even spent six bucks on a haircut, his first for years. He's back to "normal" now and keeps calm, even when Gloucester place-kickers aim at our posts.

That takes some sticking, for he's the one man who gets his hair off easily.
