Although Loughborough Colleges would be the first to admit that they don't evoke the same aura as last week's visitors — Leicester and Moseley — it certainly isn't a case of Lord Mayor's Shows and Dustcarts. While they have usually been on the receiving end, here, they've always given us plenty of entertainment and commitment.

Let's get the whole thing into perspective. Last season Gloucester won the equivalent fixture by 34 points to — well, just let's say that Loughborough gave the score board lads an easy night. If that sounds one sided, it's worth noting that the week previously we beat Newport 19 - 0, and that just three days after the Loughborough visit, we entertained Oxford University and administered chastisement to the tune of 46 - 6.

In any case, it's always a pleasure to see the sort of fitness and willingness to run which Loughborough consistently exhibit. And there's always the thought that we may be watching some of the stars of the not-too-distant future, on this occasion
