Coming up to England

They'll be out to spring a surprise, and we won't want to lose either, so, with Merit Table points at stake, and thoughts of next season's John Player at the back of everyone's mind, we shan't lack for

effort on either side tonight.

But, all those thoughts apart, it's always good to welcome a side from over the Tamar. We hope their first visit is an enjoyable one, and we'll certainly be doing our best to see that it is.

Socially inclined?

If you're the sort of character who likes a convivial chat and a drink, before and/or after the match, don't forget that you really ought to be a member of the Social Club to be able to indulge yourself in the Clubhouse.

Let's face it - you're not actually going to have to take out a hire-purchase agreement to

be able to have that privilege. The membership fee is still only 50p.

Early days yet, of course, but as the season progresses, there are going to be matches where the size of the crowd will necessitate cards being produced before you can get in at all. And we'd hate to see you go home in a state of raving teetotallism.

Nudge for Patrons

Pardon me for mentioning it, ladies and gentlemen of the Patron's Mafia, but you would do the club a favour if you would pay up as soon as the wife's housekeeping can stand it.

Obviously, it helps if Patrons' fees are paid early, expenditure and cash flow being what it is. They'll gladly accept cheques, cash or other legal tender in the office behind the Grandstand,

after the game.

Incidentally, the foregoing remarks about the Social Club also apply to Patrons. Not that anyone's going to demand 50p, because Social Club membership is part of the Patrons' package, but you will need a membership card, nevertheless.

It's a good deal!

Having started, I might as well finish the financial stuff before proceeding further.

Members will already know the advantages of taking out a season ticket, but there are a lot of people who come along on a match basis, regardless of the fact that they could be

losing quite a lot of hard-earned cash by doing so.

This is a good year for season tickets, because, even though this is the year when we have more home than away games, prices haven't gone up. Patron's membership - which includes car park and social club membership, plus freedom to stand and sit in any part of the groundis still only £25. Wing stand seasons cost £15, and ground membership £12. Senior Citizens and Juniors get reductions of around half the rate.

The money-saving calculations are interesting. At those prices you only need to attend 10 games before breaking even on ordinary admission charges, and you can rattle up that many attendances without really noticing it.

Looked at another way, it's perfectly possible to have broken even before the end of

October, with another 24 home games to go. Which has to be the bargain of the year.

There are other advantages too — as you'll find out if you decide you want to apply for International or County tickets, for example. There are also the away coach trips to think

about. You know — you could be doing yourself a favour. Why not nip along to our palatial new Office and Do something about it.
