It's a Dark Blue Day!

The visit of the Oxford University side isn't one that old Kingsholm hands would willingly miss. It's certainly one of our valued traditional fixtures, and it would be true to say that,

over the past century or so, just about all the great Dark Blues have played here.

It used to be said that Oxford University used the Gloucester game as a method of measuring their pack before taking on their old enemy from Cambridge at Twickenham. Whether that's still true, I'm in no position to judge, but for the past few seasons we've played both University sides not too long before the 'Varsity game, so that perhaps, a judgement can be formed of the relative strength of the two sides.

Looked at that way, the last two seasons are interesting. Two years ago, we suffered one of our very rare defeats, of that season, while going down 12-20 at Cambridge, while being a bit hard on Oxford by subjecting them to a 46-6 scoreline at Kingsholm. Last season, we won at Oxford by 34-6, but also beat the Light Blues 33-9.

Not that it seems to mean much — relative form isn't always the best guide when the two

old rivals get to Twickenham.

Nevertheless, one thing you can be sure about, today. Oxford U. will be a strong, fit side who'll start running at kick-off, and will still be raising a gallop at final whistle. They're all very welcome, and perhaps we can offer them a post-graduate course on the Gentle Art of Rugby Football.

Enjoyed your breather have you? Ready for a good shout? Well - you'll have plenty of opportunity, because, counting today, we have a string of five home fixtures coming up or six if you count the County.

It all starts next Wednesday — November 2nd — with a visit from the tough Glamorgan Wanderers side, who are always good value. The following Saturday offers a complete contrast, with a chance to see Rosslyn Park. Wednesday, Nov. 9th we shall have to go some to beat the phenomenon of this season's Welsh calendar, South Wales Police, and then we have the eagerly anticipated Gloucestershire v. Yorkshire encounter on the 12th. Topped up with a dose of Cheltenham on Nov. 16th, and you have quite a bill of fare.
