

The Old Year goes out in style

Somehow, it seems appropriate to be seeing 1984 out by playing a side which is normally based on a ground called Brewery Field, but I don't suppose Peter Ford took that into

account when arranging the fixture.

He was obviously more interested in securing games against a side which can justly claim to be one of the most distinguished in Wales — which means in the world — and which we haven't played as regularly as we would have liked, over the past few seasons, because of the demands of Welsh Cup matches, John Player games and inhospitable weather.

None of those factors interfered last season, however, when Gloucester lost at Bridgend

by 32 points to 15. If this sounds an uncomfortable experience, then perhaps it should be taken in context. Last season, Bridgend scored no less than 1,596 points, and ran in a mammoth 269 tries, 107 of those by the wingers.

Mark Titley scored 42 of them, which is a post-war club record, so it isn't really surprising that he rapidly established himself as an International wing. At that, he was only one of five Bridgend players who passed the 100 point mark, with full back Howell Davies only failing to quadruple that figure by 10 points. He, of course, also set a Welsh record by scoring 39 points in Five Nations Championship matches in his first season in the berth points in Five Nations Championship matches in his first season in the berth.

So there's no shortage of pedigree in the Bridgend team. They're a genuinely class side (Neath, notwithstanding), and a tough nut to crack by anyone's standards. And I don't suppose that they'll be taking it at all easily, just because we're in the Season of Goodwill.

I hope I'm not sounding too pessimistic about all this — just giving credit where it is due.

We have, after all, seen Gloucester do some pretty impressive things at Kingsholm of late, and you never know with our lot, do you?

Whatever happens, however, it's great to see Bridgend again, and we bid them a very warm welcome, coupled with all our good wishes for the rest of this season, and for the whole of 1985.

Talking about wingers, we have quite a nice little contest of our own going on about now. I'm told that, by the end of November, Nick Price and Derek Morgan had scored 10 tries each. If United matches are taken into account, Morgan had run in 17 tries, and Price 15. Of course, both of them have increased those tallies significantly in the last month, and
