#### Round Three!

It has to be said that our visitors haven't had their best season ever, so far, but they have shown indications of returning to their own high standards over the last few weeks. You may also feel that their defeat of Gosforth last Saturday represents a plus point too, because they, at least, had a run out, while our lads were languishing in limbo. But that's the way the cookie crumbles — or perhaps 'squelches' is a better word, under the circumstances.

Nevertheless, Cup Rugby is something different. No doubt both sides will be playing their socks off, and it would be a brave man who indulges in prophery today.

Whatever the occasion, however, Richmond are always welcome, and we're glad that the luck of the draw has enabled us to see them at Kingsholm two years on the trot.

#### Thanks to John Player

We at Kingsholm, of all people, ought to know how long the John Player Cup Competition has been with us, but it's still something of a surprise to learn that this is the tenth year in which Imperial Tobacco has been involved. Visitors from Richmond, or wherever, may need reminding that Gloucester won the very first competition — before sponsorship came alongand have lifted the Cup one-and-a-half times since.

When you come to think about it, an awful lot of money has come into the game, thanks to Imperial Tobacco Company. This year, for example, a total of £100,000 will be going to the 130 Clubs represented in the Competition. Next season, that figure will go up by £5,000, with a chief in 1086/7.

That will result in a total investment by the company of £872,000 in Rugby Union Football. Surely, any Rugby man must be sincerely grateful for that. The Cup has certainly added a

new dimension to the English club game, and long may it continue.

I'm afraid I can't go along with the anti-smoking lobby's contention that participation in sports sponsorship by tobacco companies should be banned. My view is that the more a sport thrives, the higher its standards become. The higher the standards, the fitter the players. The fitter the players, the less likely they are to smoke at all heavily.
