Now the answer to the quiz question I left you with on Saturday. For the benefit of anyone who wasn't here, I invited answers to the query, "Who was the last England Cricket Captain to play Rugby for Gloucester?"

Trying the thing out beforehand, I had an amazing range of answers, ranging from W. G. Grace, through Grahame Parker (who would be flattered) to Mike Smith. All, of course, wrong.

The answer is that amiable Welshman, Tony Lewis, who we still see fairly frequently, pursuing his journalistic career. Although remembered basically as a Neath player, he turned out at full back for Gloucester during the 1958/59 season, while stationed at RAF Innsworth. Afterwards, of course, he went on to achieve the considerable feat of being one of the very few England Cricket Captains to win a series in India. Not even Jardine (Douglas, not Richard) managed that.

If you want proof, or would like to know more, I would recommend Tony's very pleasant autobiography to you, published recently, and titled 'Playing Days'. It's a very good read, and allots a couple of pages to his period with, what he himself calls, 'Glos.'

He's even published a team photograph of the cherry-and-white side he played for and it includes such stalwarts as Tom Day, Brian ('Grunter') Green and Cyril Thomas. There are also anecdotes about 'Willy' Jones, in his role as a Glamorgan cricketer.
