

Neither does my memory recall any occasion when our two teams have met before, but I could be wrong about that, too, bearing in mind the array of peculiar things which have happened to the Championship over recent years.

Of course, unfamiliarity doesn't breed contempt, and indeed doesn't mean that the lads from the Royal County are any less welcome. Indeed, it's nice to see some new faces.

Neither does the ability to keep out of the record books mean that today's visitors are likely to be anyone's pushovers. If you want proof of that, it might surprise you to learn that last season's eventual Champions, Warwickshire, hadn't won the title since 1965, while you have to go right back to 1927 before you can find runners-up Kent appearing in a Final. In some ways, its only right that Gloucestershire and Berkshire should meet, because while we were winning our section of the South and South West Division, undefeated last season Berkshire were performing a similar feat in their section. And their opposition were Dorset and Wilts, Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire, all of whom have been very familiar to us in the past.

Last week, while we were being pipped by the Old Enemy, Somerset, Berkshire were losing to Cornwall. in spite of, what I am told were two good tries from Gareth Brown and Mickey Bell, so eventual placings in the Division might well be crucially affected by today's result. A big score one way or the other could necessitate the production of the calculators, depending on events at Taunton.

All in all, we have the prospect of a very interesting confrontation. So let's enjoy it. Likewise, we all hope that our visitors, their officials and supporters all have a thoroughly enjoyable visit to Cheltenham.

THE ULTIMATE SPONSORS

One name I have been studiously avoiding in writing this piece is that of THORN EMI. Not that I have anything against them whatsoever; it's just that I felt that I could achieve more impact for my usual word of thanks to the game's most generous Sponsors if I put all my grateful eggs into one basket, as it were.

It's no secret that my personal view of the Divisional Championship is that it is an unmitigated disaster, producing little good rugby, an unimportant title and achieving nothing other than possibly terminal damage to the County Championship. Under those circumstances, any Sponsor intending to reap full commercial advantage from their generosity, (and why shouldn't they?) could be forgiven for pulling out of the whole fracas and distributing their largesse elsewhere.

But it isn't all good news for the clubs concerned. I know of one or two examples where sides involved in the County Cup are having to do without key players at crucial times because of County calls, and there are local derbies that are similarly affected. So a congratulatory word is definitely in order.

Finally, thanks to you, and to all the other loyal supporters of both sides. After all, if nobody came, it wouldn't be a County match would it?
