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TALKING RUGBY with Terry Phillips

The Citizen rugby writer Terry Phillips takes a look at the Gloucester club scene - in every Cherry and White match programme.

Derrick Morgan, Gloucester's 25-year-old winger who scored four tries in the 46-9 win against Stroud in midweek, has a remarkable strike rate for the first XV.

For Morgan, who is a product of the Longlevens coaching system, passed the 100 mark with those four against Stroud - and he has played only 136 XV matches.

It is an outstanding achievement for Morgan, who joined Gloucester four years ago and made his first appearance in the Cherry and White strip for United against Broughton Park 'A' at Kingsholm during early September.

during early September.

He scored a hat-trick in a 29-12 victory that night and made his first XV debut a few days lateragainst today's opponents Coventry, also at Kingsholm.

He did not score in Gloucester's 19-14 success, but he turned in a useful performance and his speed helped create a try for Richard Mogg, who was playing on the other wing.

Morgan was selected to play against Launceston in the next match – a South West Merit table encounter at Kingsholm - and opened his first team account with four tries in a 50-0 victory.

Since then Morgan has been a regular in the Gloucester side and this season he has looked sharp and eager. On occasions Morgan has been accused of lacking defensive bite, but against Swansea and Stroud he showed a new appetite when Gloucester were under pressure and launched himself into several vital tackles.

And against Stroud on Wednesday Morgan's best try came after 38 minutes when he was caught a few yards short of the line, but wriggled through the attempted tackles to go over.

Morgan's main strength, though, is his natural speed which has carried him to many tries for the club.
