
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# TALKING RUGBY with Terry Phillips

Gloucester set out to end a run of five successive Pontypool victories in this annual fixture, which is

traditionally a fiercely contested, bruising encounter.
It was back in 1981-82 that Gloucester last defeated 'Pooler', having also earned a shock win in Wales the season before.

All the points came in the first half at Kingsholm in October 1981 and then the yellow-shirted Gloucester players had to defend stubbornl against wave after wave of Welsh attacks.

The points that night came from tries by Steve Boyle and Malcolm Preedy plus penalties from Les Jones and Tony Durkin.

And the Gloucester team that night was: A. Durkin, P. Pritchard, S. Parsloe, P. Taylor, R. Mogg, L. Jones, S. Baker, M. Preedy, S. Mills (capt.), S. Ashmead, J. Orwin, S. Boyle, J. Gadd, M. Teague,

M. Longstaff. Since then Gloucester have met Pontypool five

times and the results have been: 1982-83 Pontypool 52 Gloucester 15 1983-84 Gloucester 12 Pontypool 23 1984-85 Pontypool 19 Gloucester 3 1985-86 Gloucester 12 Pontypool 17 1986-87 Pontypool 26 Gloucester 6

And over the last 12 meetings between these teams Gloucester have won three and lost nine, scoring 118 points and conceding 217 in that

On their last visit to Kingsholm Pontypool won 17-12 in a match dominated by their powerful

pack. The ball rarely went past scrum-half David Bishop as Pontypool recovered from a nine points deficit to finish worthy winners.

Around 6,000 spectators watched that match, refereed superbly by Roger Quittenton.

Full-back Steve Lazenby kicked four penalties for the Cherry and Whites, again playing in their second choice yellow strip, but tries from Mark Brown and Geoff Davies plus three penalties by full-back Peter Lewis gave Pontypool victory.

And the Gloucester line-up that night: S. Lazenby, R. Mogg, I. Goslin, P. Taylor, J. Breeze, M. Hamlin, M. Hannaford, M. Preedy, S. Mills, R. Pascall, J. Orwin (capt.), J. Brain, J. Gadd, D. Spencer, J. Bennett.

The problem for Gloucester was that three days later they took on Harlequins in a John Smith's National Merit table match and were hammered 43-6.

Perhaps the fiercely physical clash with Pontypool had taxed the Gloucester players too much with another big game so close, but whatever the reason, the Cherry and Whites were a pale shadow of their normal selves on that disappointing day in a virtually empty Twickenham.

Certainly Gloucester looked heavy-footed and

were rarely in contention.

That experience posed a real problem when the Gloucester selectors met on Monday evening. For on Saturday Gloucester must travel to play Harlequins in the Courage Clubs championship.
