

Gloucester Rugby Club's failure to stop Waterloo's runaway start to the season was a bitter blow to their Courage Clubs Championship hopes, but the Cherry and Whites still have their eyes firmly fixed on that title.

Waterloo have opened the season with ten successive wins including two National League Division One victories — against Nottingham 10-9 and Gloucester 16-9.

But they must travel to play Bath in December and have tough away matches against Moseley, Coventry, Harlequins, Leicester and Bristol to come. Only two more matches remain at home for Waterloo – against Sale and Wasps.

Gloucester have won three of their first four matches and already the two big matches in five days at the start of December look vital.

Bath visit Kingsholm on Tuesday, December 1st and then on Saturday, December 5th the Cherry and Whites must travel to play Leicester, who are still unbeaten in the League this season with three wins from three matches.

During November Gloucester have only one Courage Championship match, the re-arranged clash with Harlequins away.

Other top clubs are busy with Leicester playing three times, Bath and Nottingham twice each.

November fixtures - Saturday, November 7th: Orrell v Sale.

Saturday, November 14: Wasps v Bath, Orrell v Bristol, Nottingham v Leicester.

Saturday, November 21st: Coventry v Bath, Leicester v Wasps, Harlequins v Gloucester.

Saturday, November 28th: Moseley v Leicester, Wasps v Nottingham.

Tonight's visitors South Wales Police play an annual fixture against Gloucester, but it is always at Kingshelm

And they have found little success over recent years, having lost 11 of the last 12 matches to be played.

Gloucester have scored more than 300 points in that run, while Police are one short of three figures on 99.

But it is often a close match with last season's encounter finishing 20-9 to Gloucester and the 1985 fixture resulted in a 15-14 success.

The lone Police win came in 1983-84 when they emerged 13-9 winners.

Tonight the Welshmen are without their Welsh internationals Bleddyn Bowen and Ritchie Collins, who are both resting before Saturday's encounter between Wales and the US Eagles.
