In 1983, Newbridge came here and gave us a tonking of quite horrid proportions — 36 points to 16, if you want the grisly details.

As I remember it, that result was largely inspired by Paul Turner, later of Newport, and now of London Welsh, and in my opinion, the best outside half qualified to play for England.

A year later, we went to Newbridge and did rather better, losing 9-17, while on their return to Kingsholm in 1985, we were a bit unlucky, going down 10-12. Last season, again at Newbridge, the home side won 13-16, so the scales look pretty evenly balanced, if you believe that records mean anything.

I always feel that Newbridge don't get the appreciation they deserve, being overshadowed, often, by the doings of the Neaths and Pontypools of this world. My experience of today's visitors is that they know how to play Rugby, and how to play it in an entertaining fashion.

I do notice that, from the results, they haven't had the best of seasons, according to their own high standards, but I can't imagine that that situation will continue indefinitely. Given the record against Gloucester, they'll be hoping that the turning point arrives today.

I wouldn't be honest if I concurred in that aspiration, but I can, with confidence, say that we all hope they have a good time, and that we're glad to see them again.

TALKING RUGBY with Terry Phillips

The Citizen rugby writer Ierry Phillips on the news from Kingsholm - in every Gloucester RFC programme.

Ruari Maclean, Gloucester's strong tackling centre, is off to Edinburgh next Wednesday — to join the Scotland squad for a training session at Murrayfield.

It all sounds a little strange to hear that Scotland have picked a player who was born in London to Welsh parents, but the 26-year-old Maclean explains: "My grandfather comes from Argyllshire and that is how I qualify.

"But then I would play for Bermuda if they wanted me!

"I am delighted to be involved in national squad training with Scotland even though I am English.

"It will be great to be involved with players I normally only see on television and, while I know my chances of winning a Scottish cap are forlorn, there may just be a chance of selection in a Scotland 'B' team.

"They usually go for uncapped players in the 'B' team and it would be great to have a game for a national team."

Maclean flies up to Edinburgh on Wednesday for the squad training and says: "I am not sure whether or not I will have to stay overnight, but thankfully Scotland are paying expenses."

Two other Gloucester players — prop Pete Jones and flanker lan Smith — are both qualified to play for the Anglo-Scots, but they have opted to be available for the South West in the Divisional Championships, which clash with the Scottish Inter-District matches.

Maclean is in the Anglo-Scots squad for their District matches against Edinburgh, South Scotland, Glasgow and the North and Midlands.

"Ăll these District matches are Scotland trials," says Maclean, "And hopefully I can do well when the selectors are watching. "I believe I was called into the Scotland squad

"I believe I was called into the Scotland squad after I played for the Anglo-Scots in their win against a French XV when I did reasonably well. "Thankfully the selectors have only watched me three or four times in all and each time I have had a reasonable match. They have not seen me have a stinker."

Maclean, a former Llanelli and Newport player, made his first team debut for Gloucester against Abertillery in October 1985, when the Cherry and Whites won 13-0. He scored three tries in 31 appearances during that first season and has now played 57 first XV matches overall, scoring seven tries.
