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TALKING RUGBY with Terry Phillips

Ğloucester Rugby Club have two more Courage Clubs Championship matches left to confirm coach Keith Richardson's pre-season belief.

Wycliffe College master Richardson said Gloucester would finish in the top half of National Division One when he set out on his first season as the Cherry and Whites' coach.

They currently lie fifth, although Richardson warns: "Mathematically there is still a chance we could be relegated if we lose our last two matches and the lower teams win a few.

"But I had hoped for a top half position and it seems we are on target to achieve that.

"Obviously I hope that, if everything goes well and we continue to progress along the lines we have laid down this season, we can mount an even better challenge next season."

Gloucester's next Courage Championship match is against Orrell away next Saturday, while they face Sale at Kingsholm on Saturday April 16.

John Orwin, who was club captain at Kingsholm a couple of seasons ago, is still hoping he will be lining up against Gloucester next season.

Orwin's new club Bedford is lying third in National Division Two and still hoping they can sneak into a promotion place.

In Area League South Stroud, who are playing Camborne at home today, still need a win to stay clear of relegation danger. After today's Camborne clash they must take on Cheltenham at the Prince of Wales Stadium later this month.

Lydney, who play at Kingsholm later this month, lie safely in fourth place, but they are desperately disappointed to have missed out on promotion and will be making a mighty effort next season to go up.

NB: The change to the Bedford and Gosforth statistics is due to Gosforth having three Championship points (and so a win) deducted according to rule 7bii. Match points for and against have been deducted from both sides.
