### TALKING RUGBY with Terry Phillips

The Citizen rugby writer Terry Phillips on the news from Kingsholm - in every Gloucester RFC

Gloucester and Lydney, meeting tonight in a match sponsored by The Citizen, can both still have a say in a Courage Championship title chase this season, although neither can now be among the benours

The Cherry and Whites have missed out in National Division One, although they still have to play leaders Leicester away and could yet upset their title charge.

And in Area League South, Lydney, still bitterly disappointed they were pushed out of the promotion race so early, travel to play unbeaten Sidcup, who must win or draw to take the title.

But Lydney are desperately keen to win against Sidcup, a result which would hand Askeans the championship and the one promotion spot available into National Division Three.

A Lydney victory would leave Sidcup in Area League South and give the Severnsiders' fixture list a much healthier look next season.

If Sidcup stay down Lydney would take on all the far flung clubs — Cambourne, Sidcup, Sudbury and Havant — at Regentsholme next season. Without those long trips to worry about, Lydney would surely start confident of earning promotion to the National Leagues.

Cheltenham have retained their Area League status, but only because of some shock results in Division Three of the National League.

The 16-4 home defeat against Stroud left Cheltenham second from bottom, but as two Northern area teams — Birmingham plus Nuneaton or Morley — are to be relegated Cheltenham look certain to stay up.

For the two relegated teams from National Division Three will go into Area League North, leaving only one — Streatham and Croydon — to go down from Area League South.

And that seems only fair, for Cheltenham were left second from bottom by a Championship committee decision.

Salisbury lost against Stroud away earlier this season, but were awarded a win because Stroud fielded an ineligible player. Those two points handed to Salisbury left them one ahead of Cheltenham.
