## TALKING RUGBY with Terry Phillips

The Citizen rugby writer Terry Phillips on the news from Kingsholm-in every Gloucester RFC programme.
Gloucester Rugby Club have opened the new season with four successive wins and their perfor-

mances so far have been highly impressive.

Coach Keith Richardson has instilled a 'Keep it simple' approach and the Cherry and Whites have responded with teamwork and support play which has proved too much for Swansea, Stroud, Moseley and Pontypridd.

Gloucester have scored 131 points in their victories and conceded 40. They have gone over for 19 tries, while full-back Tim Smith has a total of 42 points.

And skipper Marcus Hannaford has worked hard to maintain team discipline even when tempers begin to fray as they did at times during Saturday's 25-18 victory against Pontypridd away.

Hannaford moved in quickly to push the players back whenever a penalty or free-kick was awarded against them.

But, while the start has been outstanding, the true test will come this Saturday against Bath away in a

season, but they are still a formidable side and the selection of the South West Divisional side last week will add spice to an already potent local derby.

For Gloucester's Malcolm Preedy, Kevin Dunn and
Richard Pascall have been named as the front-row for
the South West match against Leinster at Bath next
Monday. They have been chosen ahead of the Bath trio
of Gareth Chilcott, Graham Dawe and Richard Lee,
while the other five forwards are all from Bath.

while the other five forwards are all from Bath. South West coach Mike Rafter has said the South West team to face Leinster is an experimental side, but he has not told the Bath players and Chilcott has said: "We will have to make our point in Saturday's match against Gloucester."

Bath have started with three wins and they have scored 116 points, conceding only 21. That includes a 50 points win against Pontypool, a 26-7 success against Harlequins and a 40-3 victory against London Welsh.

But Bath will be without scrum-half Richard Hill, who was sent off against Harlequins and is suspended.

Steve Knight will step in to replace him.

But, whatever happens at Bath on Saturday, it will not be a place for the fainthearted with Courage Championship points at stake plus front-row reputations.
