### TALKING RUGBY with Terry Phillips

The Citizen rugby writer Terry Phillips on the news from Kingsholm — in every Gloucester RFC programme.

Former Gloucester captain John Orwin is back at Kingsholm today leading Courage Championship National Division Two side Bedford.

The 34-year old England international was a big influence at Kingsholm for a number of years when he played for Gloucester while stationed at RAF Brize Norton.

He left the area when he left the RAF and took over a public house near Bedford — the Black Horse at Wootton.

He has figured prominently in Bedford's excellent start to the season — they have only lost to Leicester — and is looking forward to the challenge of today's match.

"I spent several happy seasons at Gloucester and I enjoy going back to Kingsholm," he said this week.

Orwin was back in Gloucester only a couple of weeks ago when he played for John Watkins International XV at Hempsted Lane to help Gordon League celebrate their centenary season. That match ended 36-36.

While Orwin's Bedford have made a good start in National Division Two, Gloucester went down against Bath in National Division One and then slipped up badly in midweek when they lost 18-14 and had prop Pete Jones sent off.

It was a disappointing defeat after Gloucester had led 11-0 at half-time and 14-3 five minutes into the second period and the first loss against Exeter for six seasons.

The Cherry and Whites must bounce back quickly from those two defeats before a minor hiccup becomes a major crisis.

But today's match against a useful Bedford team is the chance to return to winning ways and skipper Marcus Hannaford will be keen for his team to show the form they found in excellent wins against Swansea and Moseley earlier this season.
