Dewi Morris has won the votes for the first Whitbread Player of the Month for the new season — and is eighth in all — after a superb start to the season. Dewi is a sturdy scrum-half (6 foot tall, weighing 13½ stone) and was born in Crickhowell near Ebbw Vale, so he has dual Welsh and English qualifications. He went to Brecon High School and whilst there played for his school, Brecon Town, Gwent Schools and Mid-Wales Youth, he continued his education at Crewe and Alsager College, for whom he played, whilst he also joined Winnington Park, helping them to promotion to Area League North. Whilst there, he played



county rugby for Cheshire at Under-21 'B' and full county level. He has made a tremendous start to the season with his debut for Lancashire's full county XV and a star appearance for the North XV which thrashed an International XV recently at Gateshead and is playing for England 'B' today.

### A visit to Kingsholm by B.G.Cragg

Good clean fun and nothing too complicated, incidentally "Tosh" survived the afternoon and also visited parts of Kingsholm where fresh grass was still growing.

Larger than life personalities colour the atmosphere within a club. Nowadays we hear a lot about player transfer. How about swapping our David Boult for your "Digger" Morris. Would either club survive the shock? In comparison to Gloucester L.S.H. is still the adolescent but we are learning. Let us hope that today's game will contribute to the learning process but maybe after the game you will find we know a thing or two about being hospitable — a home win would help.
