Blackheath were also one of the twenty clubs, which included such defunct organisations as Flamingoes and Queen's House, which founded the original Rugby Football Union. So we could hardly have opponents with a better pedigree than we have today.

All of which makes this an auspicious occasion. Let's lay back and enjoy it.

Gloucester did their chances of earning runners-up

spot in the Courage Clubs Championship the power of good with a 28-0 win against Leicester at Kingsholm.
