If any of the Nottingham contingent, so welcome here today, were touched by this in any way at all, then our thoughts are with them, and we hope that, in some small measure, their visit to Kingsholm will take their minds off

Four clubs are on 13 points — seven behind Bath — going into today's game. They are Gloucester, Wasps, Nottingham and Orrell.
And today's fixtures are: Bristol v. Liverpool St. Helens, Gloucester v. Nottingham, Harlequins v. Moseley, Leicester v. Bath, Rosslyn Park v. Orrell, Waterloo v. Wasps.
That Leicester v. Bath league match has to go ahead even though the clubs meet again in the Pilkington Cup final a week later.
The RFU have decided the rules and regulations of the league system have to be unheld and the match must be

played today.

Bath had asked that the Pilkington Cup final should also

count for League points.
