# TALKING RUGBY with Steve Fraser



The Gloucester selectors faced two classic dilemmas in picking the team for today's match.

Firstly, who do you pick when a first team regular returns from injury but the player filling in for him has done the job well?

And secondly, which do you choose when an outstanding first team prospect for the future is not playing as well as an experienced player in the second XV?

In the first case, see Lloyd Gardiner and Marcus Hannaford, in the second, John Etheridge and John Brain.

Gardiner came in for Hannaford when a nasty leg injury ruled out last season's captain for nearly a month. Bar one or two jittery moments against Wasps, he has done a first rate job.

The former Spartans scrum-half had the character to hold his own in the crucial tussle with Bath's Richard Hill in his first appearance in a Courage League game. And he has linked up well with half-back partner Mike Hamlin.

John Etheridge is becoming a regular at England squad sessions and is one of Gloucester's best young prospects for the national side.

But he has yet to recapture last season's form and was passed over by the England selectors when they named the teams to face Fiji next week.

John Brain, on the other hand, has been one of the key figures in United's successes this season. And his partnership with Nigel Scrivens in the second row against Ebbw Vale was the outstanding feature of the Gloucester performance.

Neither decision was easy to make but in both cases the selectors went for experience

"We feel sorry for Lloyd Gardiner because he has played very well indeed," said team secretary Fred Reed. "But Marcus came through on Saturday and we want to see him back in the first team.

"It's felt that John Etheridge has not

reached the form he had last season. John Brain has been playing very well indeed and he deserves the chance."

United winger Chris Dee is another in-form player who has been ousted by an "old hand". Nick Price is back in action this weekend for United and will soon be pressing Derrick Morgan and Jim Breeze for a first team place.

Reed said: "Dee has played very well this season — better than he has played since he arrived here. But again Nick is the established player and we want to see him."

Dee, Gardiner and Etheridge may have missed out this time but their presence speaks volumes about the strength in depth at the club. They'll be back!
