







So, what else is new?





Two years ago Gloucestershire reached the final before losing to Yorkshire at Twickenham and a repeat trip looks probable for a team who have scored 155 points and conceded only 32 in five under 21 victories.

The talent within the team is undeniable — players like lock Dave Sims, fly-half Neil Matthews, back-row player Greg Keyse and prop Tony Windo from Gloucester, scrum-half Julian Davis and flanker Julian Horrobin from Bristol all surely have a big future in the game.

But Godfrey Cullimore, the chairman of selectors for the County senior team, says: "I watched the 41-10 win against Berkshire and it is certainly an outstanding under 21 team, but how many of these lads will be available for the senior County Championship games?"

It is a good question and it seems likely that none of them will go on to play for Gloucestershire at senior level.

For currently Gloucester and Bristol prefer their players to opt out of County rugby and go for Divisional selection with the South West team.

You can see why the clubs take that stance for if they support both Divisional and County teams their leading players will be missing for weeks on end and with the current pressures of big games that would be unnacceptable.

But for County selectors it is a major problem.

They see talented young players coming through the system, players capable of leading Gloucestershire to great success, knowing they will not be able to use them.

It is frustrating for Cullimore and his fellow selectors as they try to piece together a County side without any Gloucester on Bristol players — and so far, while the County have not achieved the success of previous years, they have done pretty well.
